a limited quantity of handmade bags by the Banjara Gypsies of India is available for purchase. The sale of these bags will benefit the churches that many of the Banjara attend.

The Banjara Gypsies of India, the ancestors of the European or Romany Gypsies, originated from Northwest India. Gypsies migrated to the Middle East, North Africa, Europe and Russia. The Banjara also migrated within India during the time of Muslim rule. Today the majority live in three states surrounding Hyderabad, the former Muslim capital.

As “Christ followers”—in Africa, Asia, Europe and North America and other places around the globe—CBF Global Missions field personnel carry out God’s work around the world. **100 percent** of this year’s offering will support global ministries in a variety of ways. For five years, **Sam Bandela**, one of CBF’s Global Missions field personnel, has been working patiently among hill tribes in the mountainous central region of India. Even as tsunami relief and personal challenges intervened, Bandela continued to find trusted local partners, train indigenous church planters and fund development projects in the area.

Among three tribal groups – Sora, Jathava and Kui – in the mountainous region between the Andhra Pradesh and Orissa states, 50 new churches have been planted as dozens of families have embraced Jesus Christ, some in spite of active resistance by other religious groups.



Nomie Derani, one of the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship’s field personnel, moved to Brooklyn in 2004 and started the Friendship Center. A native of Lebanon, Derani considers herself an evangelist. When she teaches, Derani talks about current events in the community and leads discussions about subjects which are relevant to the women’s daily lives, such as parenting. Each Thursday, she leads an hour-long session called Heart to Heart that focuses on Bible stories.

At the Friendship Center, the motto is “To love them, so they ask why.” In tangible ways, Derani shows Christ-like love by helping with immigration papers and legal issues, providing furniture and clothing, giving food baskets, cleaning apartments, teaching classes and providing a listening ear. While Derani has encountered people who challenge her ministry, she has also met those who seek her out when they need help.

Food for the Hungry

! PROJECT 81429, Middle East—Hunger Relief Ministry. Baptist Christians in many parts of the Middle East have been going through an extremely hard time during the last few years. Poor economy has caused many Baptists to lose their jobs and live with no stable income. There are thousands of Christians in these countries that live at poverty levels and many struggle to survive. This project provides assistance to individuals and families that need help during a month.

___ \$30 will buy basic food and household items that include sugar, rice, milk, water, wheat, grains and some cleaning products. (description: basic food)

___ \$50 will buy basic medication for a family—vitamins, antacids or medications for a specific illness. (description: medication)

PROJECT 80548, Macedonia—Kindergarten Educational Development Project. This project provides a free kindergarten education for some of the poorest children in Skopje, Macedonia. In addition to the class work, lots of love, and support, a warm meal is provided each day in an effort to improve the overall health of the children.

___ \$40 will buy food for one day, for all children currently enrolled in the school. (description: breakfast/lunch program)

Meals for One Child, for One Week

___ \$7 will buy food for one child, for one week. (description: one child/one week).

PROJECT 80215, Middle East—Gypsy Church Start. The only Gypsy Church in the Middle East and North Africa ministers among some of the most destitute people in the world. Forgetting their own poverty, the church shares physically, spiritually and emotionally in the lives of others.

Christmas Meal for Gypsy Church

___ \$750 will allow 30 Gypsy Christian families to receive a Christmas dinner. (description: Christmas Dinner)

___ \$25 will allow one Gypsy Christian family to receive a Christmas dinner. (description: one family)



PROJECT 80855, Indonesia—Hunger Relief. This project provides milk for village children that are in a scholarship program, as well as widows and their families. This project also helps street kids that beg for money. Instead of giving them money, boxes of UHT milk is provided, which they can sell.

___ \$1,200 will support the purchase of Milk for 30 Village Children for a Year. (description: village)

___ \$100 per month will purchase Milk for Street Kids. (description: street kids)

! PROJECT 81132, Kenya—Change for Children. Through the “Change for Children” program you can help make it possible for a nursery-aged child to attend school in one of several Integrated Child Development Centers (ICDC), built in partnership with communities throughout Kenya.

___Your donation in increments of \$50 will be used to purchase two sets of uniforms for one child.

! PROJECT 85051, Thailand—Student Work/Study Program. A work/study program is offered at Upland Holistic Development Project (UHDP) Small Farm and Agroforestry Resource Center that enables up to six Palaung and Lahu young people to obtain a high school degree while living in a safe environment at the UHDP Center. The young people engage in farm chores at the center, enabling them to obtain agricultural skills.

___Your donation in increments of \$100 will be used to cover cost associated with the work/study program.

PROJECT 81414, North Africa—Educational Aid and Assistance for African University Students. This project is part of a long-range solution to the refugee/migrant situation. The plan is to assist the best and the brightest of Africa to finish their studies and return to their countries of origin with a vision for the development and future of their own countries.

___Your donation in increments of \$80 will provide the support necessary to keep a student in their studies.

PROJECT 85183, Hungary—Gandhi School. The Ghandi School, a school of about 200 Romany students, grade 6-12 needs supplies and equipment. Although a government sponsored school, it is a low priority for government funding, leaving the school with many needs. The school also sponsors a summer camp for ESL students that is operated by volunteers.

___Your donation in increments of \$100 covers the cost for supplies and equipment.

PROJECT 80188, Romania—Ruth School Building Fund. The Ruth School will build a new facility for teaching grades 5-8 to Gypsy children. With the new facility, all of the compulsory education required in Romania (grades 1-8) will be offered to Gypsy children who have no opportunity to attend public school. The new building will also include medical and hygiene facilities and will be located in the same neighborhood as the current school which teaches grades 1-4. The new school is scheduled to be completed in Summer, 2008.

"I was sitting alone in the cafeteria of the faculty of humanities at my university one day when an older student walked up and asked if I had ever heard about Jesus. I said that I heard a little bit, but didn't know many details. He invited me to a program that night at his church—a group of Chinese-American Christians was putting on a show with drama, dance, etc. I went, and at the end of the program they had everyone bow their heads and close their eyes, and asked if anyone wanted to accept Christ. I put my hand up. Believing is difficult for many people in my country, but it was very easy for me, maybe because so many people were praying for me! I had actually visited a church once before—I saw the people worshipping with great emotion, and thought that they were all crazy. Now I understand that they were just praising God from the depths of their hearts.

"After graduation, I volunteered as an intern at our church for six months, so I could grow more.

"I would like to thank those people and churches who provided the scholarship funds for me to attend university and who prayed for me. My prayer request would be that I can become the best evangelist possible among [my people]—to lead my family and my village to the Lord."

Baw, who has received scholarship funding, is the first believer in her village and only the second of her tribe to come to faith in this country.

!PROJECT 80313, Northern Thailand—Scholarship.

___ \$30 provides school supplies and school uniforms for an AIDS orphan for one semester.

___ \$150 provides tuition assistance to a vocational school student for one semester.

___ \$600 Provides annual seminary tuition for a young lady preparing for a career in Scripture translation.

!PROJECT 80311, Northern Thailand—Translation and Literacy.

___ \$200 provides the monthly salary for one native-speaker translation assistant.

!PROJECT 80312, Northern Thailand Translation Project.

___ \$300 provides the monthly salary for one native speaker translation assistant.



Building Bridges of Community, Los Angeles, California. International students have many needs when coming to the United States for graduate school. Culture shock, lack of funds, separation from spouses, and a feeling of inferiority are all common experiences among these students. Hospitality and a sense of community are essential in befriending students.

!PROJECT 81668, Los Angeles, Calif.—A Cup of Chai.

___ Your donation in increments of \$50 will be used for projects that provide an emotional outlet for international students as well as the opportunity to meet fellow international students.

!PROJECT 81665, Los Angeles, Calif.—Welcome activities for international students.

___ Your donation in increments of \$25 will be used to welcome newly arrived international students, scholars and their family members at a luncheon during international student orientation.

Language and Education

PROJECT 81172, China—Leadership Training. Churches in China that have called out students are not always able to fully support their young people in seminary. Scholarship assistance ensures that the students are able to complete their four years training and return to provide much needed leadership in their home churches.

In a country where there are approximately 7,000 believers for every seminary trained, ordained pastor, trained lay leadership is crucial for healthy church growth. Many lay leaders are trained at the Guangxi Christian Council Lay Training Center.

___ \$150 will support a lay leader from a small town or village for nine months. (description: lay leader).

___ \$300 provides one semester scholarship for a student in a Chinese seminary. (description: student-semester).

___ \$600 provides an annual scholarship for a student in a Chinese seminary. (description: student-annual).



PROJECT 81177, China—Guangxi Elementary Project. Angel House, a school for children with cerebral palsy, is the first school these special needs students attend in Guangxi, China.

___ \$1 would provide three meals a day for a student at Angel House. (description: three meals)

___ \$20 would provide one day of meals for 20 students enrolled at Angel House. (description: students)

___ \$35 will provide one week salary for one special education or physical therapist teacher at Angel House. (description: teacher)

___ \$100 would provide monthly tuition relief to parents of one child with cerebral palsy attending school at Angel House. (description: tuition)

! PROJECT 81195, Middle East—Children’s Ministry. Children without parents and on the lower end of society are not treated well in the Middle East. They have very few chances to change their life. The project is designed to help them while building bridges to share our faith.

___ Your donation helps provide ESL classes, food and clothing; and helps support an orphanage where over 200 children receive care.

! PROJECT 89751, Slovak/Czech—Roma Mission Support. Each Sunday, Roma from Cinobana travel on public transportation to attend services at the sponsoring church in Lucenec.

___ \$2 will provide a round-trip ticket for one person to attend church.

! PROJECT 89752, Czech Republic—Bethel-House of Christian Help. An overwhelming majority of children living in the Czech Republic's state-run orphanages are Romany. When they are eighteen years old, they are too old to live in the orphanage any longer, but too often do not have the basic life skills necessary for them to live on their own. The half-way house of the Bethel ministries in Litomerice, Czech Republic provides young adults coming out of state-run orphanages up to three years to learn life skills and job-training.

___ \$100 will support one young adult for one month in Bethels' half-way house.



! PROJECT 80087, Gostivar, Macedonia and surrounding region. There are a growing number of Beggars in Gostivar. This project assists in providing education, training and opportunities to begin a cottage industry or obtain employment. The focus of the project is to help those who are begging and/or the handicapped and includes an on-going ministry of providing food and clothing to people who need this type of emergency assistance.

___ Your donation in increments of \$50 will help support this ministry.

PROJECT 85217, Middle East —Community Water Tanks. Tent communities in the Middle East face the daily task of hauling water from any source where they can secure it. At times they resort to impure water at construction sites. While such water is intended to be mixed with cement for construction, the Dom uses it as their drinking water. The goal is to provide the gift of water to a Gypsy camp in the Middle East.

___ \$100 will purchase a tank and set-up for a community

! PROJECT 81415, North Africa—This project helps refugees and migrants in North Africa take a degree of control of their lives and provide for themselves basic human needs. Micro-enterprise projects can be started that allow the refugees/migrants to use their abilities and talents.

___ \$50 provides start-up funds for a micro-enterprise project.

! PROJECT 80089, Skopje, Macedonia—Barak School Renovation Project. One of the poorest schools in Skopje—Barak School—was scheduled for demolition several years ago. At some point school district lines were redrawn, another school renovated and the Barak School, built in 1947, was left for the children from the poorer families to attend. No one seemed to care about these children anymore.

This project, planned for completion in 2009 will change that. Partnering churches and individuals are invited to give to the renovation of the building and classrooms, provide school and classroom supplies, textbooks and winter clothing and shoes for the 650 students that will attend.



___ Your donation will help support this \$57,000 project that will have a lasting effect on the community and the families that will be the recipients.

! PROJECT 80645, Jordan—Sewing and Needlework Project. The goal of this project is to provide supplies and equipment needed to give work to women who are homebound for various reasons—widows, homebound mothers, or women homebound due to physical reasons. It aims to give them a sense of self-worth as well as a means of income. It also provides a vehicle for visiting these women in their homes and establishing relationships with them in order to share the Good News.

- ___ \$2.00 will purchase a skein of cording used in making gift bags. (description: cording)
- ___ \$2.00 will purchase a yard of fabric (usually purchased by the bolt). (description: fabric)
- ___ \$8.00 will purchase a box of embroidery thread. (description: thread)
- ___ \$11.00 will purchase a bag of 1,000 beads used in making gift bags. (description: beads)
- ___ \$30.00 will purchase an iron. (description: iron)
- ___ \$500.00 will purchase a steam press. (description: steam press)



PROJECT 80943, Southeast Asia—The River Ministry. The centerpiece of this project is a medical boat that services villages along a major river system in Southeast Asia. The medical boat is staffed with a team of one doctor, one dentist, two medical nurses and one dental nurse. Each patient pays a small fee, but the cost of the medical consultation is much larger.

- ___ \$35 provides a doctor's consultation and prescribed medication. (description: consultation)
- ___ \$135 will cover the cost of a nurse for one month. (description: nurse)
- ___ \$195 will cover the cost of a doctor or dentist for one month. (description: doctor/dentist)



PROJECT 80857, Southeast Asia—The goal of this program is to assist villages in obtaining clean water by working with them to build sand filters to filter well or river water and provide worker support.

- ___ \$200 for each system
- ___ \$2,000 annually for worker support

PROJECT 89881, Athens, Greece—PORTA The Albania House in Athens. The Albania House in Athens is envisioned as a hospitality, culture and reconciliation center for Albanian immigrant families in Athens. Its facilities and programs welcome Albanians, affirm their ethnic identity, provide a warm, trustworthy setting in which they can learn about Christ and His church, receive practical care, build respectful relationships with Greeks, as well as network to enhance their experiences in the new setting. Launched in June 2007, gifts provided now assist with the many expenses associated with building an inventory of resource materials, beginning its crucial first programs, and ministering to present needs of Albanian immigrant families in Athens.

___ \$5 provides a child's first Bible in Albanian. (description: child's Bible)

___ \$8 provides a family's first Bible in Albanian. (description: family Bible)

___ \$10 provides a child's library book. (description: library book)



___ \$20 provides a child's Albanian language textbook. (description: textbook)

___ \$30 provides a child's backpack and school supplies. (description: school)

___ \$30 provides an adult's English language textbook. (description: adult school)

___ \$50 provides a "New Baby Welcome Kit." (description: new baby)

___ \$75 provides arts and crafts materials for one session. (description: art and crafts)

___ \$200 provides textbooks for an entire children's Albanian language class. (description: class textbooks)

___ \$300 provides a child's scholarship to 3 weeks of Christian Camp in the summer. (description: camp)

___ \$300 provides benevolence funds to help worthy, but unemployed, Albanians pay their utilities bill for one month. (description: benevolence)

___ \$300 provides textbooks for an entire adult English language class. (description: adult class)

___ \$400 provides an original Albanian oil painting to decorate the center. (description: painting)

___ \$500 provides child-sized table and chairs. (description: table and chairs)

___ \$500 helps to provide ethnic Albanian costumes for a children's folk dance program. (description: costumes)

___ \$1400 provides rent for the PORTA facility for one month. (description: rent)

PROJECT 80052, Thailand—Upland Holistic Development Project (UHDP)

The following list of animals, seedlings and other materials needed for the programming of the UHDP in needy hilltribe communities offers a suggested donation amount for each item. Each donation amount reflects the cost of producing or purchasing each item, associated transportation expenses as well as the cost related to providing training and other technical assistance. All gifts are considered “symbolic” and will be used toward the overall rural development programming of UHDP.



Pigs—UHDP offers farmers who've received training, in addition to having prepared proper housing and feeds, the chance to receive piglets of improved breeds. Given adequate care, these pigs have the potential of doubling the number of piglets per litter, compared to common, less productive breeds and can grow to twice the size in a much shorter length of time. Being adapted to local conditions, these productive breeds can help make backyard pig farming in the mountain villages more profitable, thereby improving the food sufficiency of hilltribe families.

___ \$100 per farmer enables each to receive a healthy young pig for her/his backyard enterprise. (description: pigs)



Catfish Tanks. As a result of the current worldwide bird flu epidemic, governments around the world have begun to crackdown on the backyard production of chickens and other poultry. In lieu of raising chickens, UHDP has begun to encourage the backyard production of catfish in concrete tanks. During the warmest months (March through October) families can raise a batch of catfish from fingerlings to market size in only three months.

___ \$75 will help families obtain reduced cost catfish tank materials to begin a productive backyard aquaculture project. (description: catfish)



Sets of Livestock Vaccines and Other Medicines. Many families attempting to improve incomes through the production of pigs are capable of improving housing and feeds for their animals. However, the initial cost of vaccines and other medicines can be too expensive for farm budgets, particularly prior to earning income from their backyard livestock enterprises.

___ \$10 per set of medicines will provide an initial boost towards eventual self-sufficiency. (description: medical supplies)



Vegetable Garden Seed Sets. Home vegetable gardens could help many poor hilltribe families produce a variety of nutritious vegetables and create savings from food budgets. However, access to desired vegetable seeds is becoming increasingly difficult due to the gradual loss of various traditional varieties. Challenging conditions in the villages make the production of many types of vegetables difficult. Locally adapted vegetable varieties include sweet corn, eggplants, pumpkins, beans, edible gourds and greens.

___ \$1 per packet of three different varieties of vegetable seeds. (description: seed sets)

PROJECT 80052, Thailand—Upland Holistic Development Project (UHDP)



Household Water Storage Tanks. The dry season in northern Thailand is five to six months long. By the end of the annual drought, the soil is parched and village water systems are often too depleted to supply adequate water for home gardens and backyard nurseries.

___\$100 would help UHDP subsidize the construction of household water storage tanks for dry season use. (description: water tanks)



Shade Cloth for Home Gardens and Nurseries. Backyard gardens and nurseries can offer hilltribe families access to homegrown fruits and vegetables. Home nurseries can also enable families to produce their own supply of seedlings for orchards and agro forests and boost incomes from the sale of plants. However, for successful production, village home gardens and nurseries must be adequately enclosed to protect plants from children and animals.

___\$30 will enable UHDP to make rolls of shade cloth for enclosing garden and nursery spaces. (description: shade cloth)



Sets of Family Agro forest Seedlings or Perennial Garden Seedlings. With limited farmland, in many hilltribe communities the only hope of increasing crop production area is by actually farming in the forest. This means employing agro forestry techniques that allow a few common crops such as tea or coffee to be produced in a forest environment. But to a greater degree, many other non-timber forest products (rattan, bamboo, spices) can be grown as well, whether in lush jungles or in recovering degraded forests. Where excessive share, poor soils and dry conditions make conventional home gardening difficult, the use of food producing trees offers the best opportunity for increasing hilltribe food sufficiency. Combinations of common tropical fruits, vegetable-producing trees and native forest plants can provide a year-round variety of fruits, shoots and vegetables that help sustain hilltribe families even during the driest months.

___\$50 will provide a diverse selection of 25-75 seedlings. (description: 25-75 seedlings)

Household Latrines. Nine years ago, very few families in UHDP project communities had access to a latrine. Today, almost a quarter of the households have their own toilets, but obviously there's much more work to be done so as to enable all families to increase the sanitary conditions around their homes.

___\$100 helps UHDP subsidize the cost of materials (and delivery) needed to construct a latrine with a simple water seal toilet and concrete tile septic tank. (description: latrine)

Miscellaneous Gifts

Indigenous Outreach Projects. Help put field personnel from within the local cultures on the field. Often, they can serve in places where we cannot and with better cultural and language proficiency than personnel from outside those cultures.

!PROJECT 81192, Middle East—International Fellowship. This project provides for the needs of an international fellowship in a Middle Eastern city of three million people. The fellowship is actively involved in outreach, evangelism, discipleship and national leadership development.

___Your donation, in increments of \$100 will help meet the needs of funding a college student coffee house and Bible training for prospective national leaders.

!PROJECT 80167. The Indigenous Missionary Project of the European Baptist Federation, with whom CBF partners, is currently supporting 65 church planters in 24 nations in Europe, the Middle East and Central Asia. These church planters are supported for five years, receiving few funds in the final three years, as the church begins to support them.

___Your donation of \$300 to \$550 will support a church planter for a month.

PROJECT 81412, Middle East—Medicines for Migrants. This project is an effort to reach out with the love of Christ to people who are abandoned, abused and neglected. Many live in the open and have no medical care—sickness and disease are rampant. This project will respond to this need by providing the most necessary medicines to children and adults.

___\$3 provides anti-fever and pain medication. (description: medication)

___\$8 provides a basic medical consultation. (description: consultation)

___\$15 provides for a medical x-ray. (description: x-ray)

___\$15 provides one round of anti-biotic treatment. (description: anti-biotic)

___\$25 provides dental services. (description: dental)

___\$30 provides a blood test. (description: blood test)

___\$45 provides a sonogram for a pregnant woman. (description: sonogram)

PROJECT 81413, Middle East—Refugee/Migrant Assistance Center. This project will assist local congregations in trying to meet the most immediate spiritual and physical needs of the refugee/migrant. Areas of ministry include spiritual guidance and prayer, listening and encouragement, meeting basic needs—food, shelter and medicine, emergency lodging for medical crisis, counseling on how to take the next step and looking together for solutions for the future.

___\$3 provides the refugee or migrant to call their family back home. (description: telephone call)

___\$4 provides a blanket for a family. (description: blanket)

___\$15 provides a food pack—enough for two people to eat for two weeks. (description: food pack)

___\$20 provides a new born baby pack. (description: new born)

___\$50 provides one month of emergency housing. (description: housing)

!PROJECT 89832, Spain—Migration Crisis and Relief. There are two fundamental needs of internationals that have migrated to or are migrating through southern Spain. The first need is to aid in the crisis stage of migration—initial intake and assessment, basic first aid, supplies and food. The second is to assist and follow-up with internationals by providing relief for the situations in their lives through humanitarian programs and spiritual outreach.

___Your donation in increments of \$100 will assist in meeting these two fundamental needs.

Missions is more than a monetary contribution that goes somewhere far away to people we never see. Missions means a million little stories and reflections.
